### YUSUF ARAKKAL An article by GIRIDHAR KHASNIS

In private conversations, Yusuf Arakkal recalls vivid images

of his childhood. One of them is that of a young boy sitting on a sturdy rock silently gazing at an uncertain future.

Still in his mid-teens, he has run away from his home in Chavakkad (in Kerala) to Bangalore.

Coming out of the railway station with a small bundle of clothes and a princely sum of thirteen rupees in his pocket, he gazes at unfamiliar

faces all around. The city holds promise but offers no food or shelter to him. In days to come he has to sleep in the cold confines of an abandoned railway wagon, eat meagerly, wash and drink from public tap. And sit on the rock with fear, anxiety, and insecurity... This is a typical unforgotten self-portrait of Yusuf Arakkal.



In more than four decades as an artist, Yusuf has painted and exhibited countless portraits of men and women. Constructing the life along Ganges on his canvas with new eyes, he has intercepted literary works with artistic vision, interpreted the Crucifixion, and revisited (Pablo Picasso's) Guernica. The charm and essence of Gauguin's woman, Vermeer's Lace-maker, Picasso's boy, Modigliani's nude, van Gogh's boot, Munch's girl, Chagall's Ida, Joseph Beuy's felt suit, Paul Klee's Equilibrist and, Henry



Moore's mother have graced his works. Nude studies, still-life's, abstract constructs... he has made them all. In this wide-ranging repertoire, if one were to point a common element, it would be that of pain and melancholy. In some way or the other, they all carry the latent heat of a



sturdy rock on a cheerless winter morning.

Series after series, Yusuf's work has resonated with his own memories, associations and life experiences. In his paintings, he has celebrated the extraordinary power of ordinary people, the abandoned ones, whose hours of

departure are not certified on any official timetable.

Exploring the hidden pathways and eerie labyrinths of an uncharted landscape, the artist in him has looked at the protagonists with care and compassion. His 'models' are ordinary people doing ordinary things in ordinary circumstances. Entrenched in



solitude, they lead their lives silently concealing their anguish, suffering, insecurity. For Yusuf, they have always remained the poignant voices of the street. Muted voices, yes; lifeless, no. In his present series too, Yusuf Arakkal carries the murmur

of the street to his image. In here he has painted his favorite portraits. That of a child. The child of his vision. The child of his soul. The child of his dream. In these works one can see that the artist is both the 'I' and the 'eye' of the child.

Working this series, Yusuf has once again proved that for him, the art of painting is an act of faith, an act of



affirmation, an act of courage. True, he is himself no longer the suffering adolescent sitting on a hard rock on a cold winter morning staring at an uncertain future with fear in his heart. Neither is he a tormented artist groping for an alluring but elusive image to reside on his canvas. The ups and downs of life have taught him to accept things with grace and magnanimity. Yet in the corner of his heart is that little murmur, a drifting whisper, an unforgettable reminder of the child in him. And when that child appears on his screens, his prints, his paints and on his canvas, it recreates a familiar yet fresh magic. A magic where the friendly 'hero' merges with an inner landscape. The child on the canvas catches you in its gaze. His piercing stare shakes you, wakes you up, and reminds you of its glorious bequest. Bathed in somber light and set amidst abstract nudges, sturdy lines, enduring textures, his expressions are charming yet mysterious. In the midst of diversely-coloured solemnity, you sight his innocence, mischief, cheer, wit, not to forget anger, torment and anguish. And then a crucified figure appears out of thin air. A blessing? A premonition? And as you take him in – singly or in combination - he flashes a winsome smile. If this isn't magic, what is?

The watercolours in this series present a man in solitude. At one level, they seem to be inspired by Vincent van Gogh's Old Man with His Head in His Hands (1882), a fascinating portrait of a man in despair. Yusuf's protagonist shares the desolation; he is a present day



figure but his pain is as hurtful. Seated in varying postures, gripped by a melancholic silence...

In essence, be it the child or the man, Yusuf's painting is not really about an individual's predicament. It is not about style or technique. It is about walls and shadows. It is about universal feelings. It is about passages of the soul. In the coldest hour of departure.

GIRIDHAR KHASNIS is a Bangalore-based freelance writer. His articles on art, literature and cinema have appeared in important newspapers and magazines. A self-taught artist and collage-maker, Giridhar has designed book covers for Oxford University Press, New Delhi, Penguin and several other prestigious publications.

Giridhar has recently curated a theme-based art show involving more than thirty painters. He has also developed the concept for a short film on the artist, Yusuf Arakkal. His current engagements include editing a book on three prominent artists of South India, and profiling some of the most important living artists of the country.














